



There are two special events coming that I want to call to your attention. They will both be on the same day – they are really so important! On September 12th at 2:00 p.m. we will dedicate our new Fire exhibit. It is certainly a great tribute that during these very trying economic times we have succeeded in opening two new exhibits in one year. The Fire exhibit is through the generosity of Rose Hadaway who pledged \$5,000 for the exhibit and Valero Refining who through their education grant gave the additional \$5,000 needed for it. Rose donated her father's uniform for the display. Incidentally, Rose and our president, David Galligan's wife, Gloria are sisters so they will be special guest at the dedication.

Immediately after the dedication guests are invited to Stone Hall to celebrate 50 years of marriage with Beverly and Jim Phelan. Anyone who has spent time at the museum is aware that out of that 50 years Beverly has spent nearly half of it in service of the museum. During that time Beverly has earned the respect and appreciation of countless members, volunteers and board members. She has gained much knowledge and honed her skills under the guidance of Harry Wassmann so that she was able to take over as curator when Harry retired.

A very important event that we hope you will come to is the annual membership meeting on the 26th of September. At that meeting you will vote on the slate of Board members and hear the reports for the past fiscal year. It is your opportunity to zero in on the operations of your museum and its progress towards becoming the best little museum in California and beyond. We are very proud of the museum, the increased interest by the community and the giant steps we have taken in the past few years.

The biggest event to come is our Costume Ball which will be held on October 30th. While costumes are encouraged, you can come without dressing up in costume but we think it will be a lot of fun. We will be getting more details out to you but we want you to save the date! Our friends at the Rellik Tavern are assisting us with the libations.

Curator's Corner NEW EXHIBIT OPENING ON SEPT. 12, 2010-FIRE & FIREFIGHTERS

So many things are happening in the Collection and Exhibits
Department! We have planned exhibits to install and others to embellish. Our priority right now is completing the Fire & Firefighters exhibit. The interactive is in place and operational, we have a display case of firefighting items in place, we need to obtain proper mannequins to use for the firefighting uniforms, we have an ax from Yuba Mfg. fire department, a



red fire alarm box and a hose from decades ago to hang on the walls. The exhibit will be opening on Sunday, September 12 at 2 p.m. The speaker will be our new Fire Chief Steve Vucurevich. Rose Hadaway, a local realtor, is a major sponsor of this exhibit. We have just installed an exhibit on the First Presbyterian Church, the first Protestant church in California. Included in the exhibit is a portrait of Rev. Sylvester Woodbridge, his bible from 1850, a communion cup from the church and his first sermon. The Museum also has in its exhibit area a pew from that church. Not on exhibit is ¼ of the bell tower from the church.

We are also working on embellishing present exhibits. We have more photos of General Vallejo and his family, new military uniforms to put in the Benicia Arsenal exhibit, new camel collection, new Victorian items in the Victorian living room and more will be exhibited in the coming weeks.

Our most recent donation is a very large painting of a dam with tainter gates and cranes that were manufactured at Yuba Mfg. in Benicia. It will be on display in the Industrial Exhibit building. The donor is Bill Scarrett of Benicia with the help of friend Sam Willis. This is a wonderful addition to our industrial story.

We are extending our contribution to Arts Benicia's Structure and Light exhibit on the Yuba Mfg. site. It will close the week of Sept. 13. Our next exhibit for that space will be a toy exhibit which will cover the period up to the 1950s. If you have any items to contribute to this exhibit call Beverly 745-5435 and let her know. There will be a notice in the Benicia Herald soon on what items we are looking for.
