Happy New Year. What will 2009 bring? We, of course, want to keep moving on our adventure of making the Benicia Historical Museum the best little museum in California and beyond. We have some exciting things happening. We know that we cannot launch any big projects just now but there are lots of smaller ones that we can make happen. A very important one is the reconfiguration of the upper parking lot. We will very likely be doing

work in Stone Hall to restore its integrity. Plans will be developed for the moving of the Scampo and the Galilee and the recovering of the stern of the Galilee.

There continue to be many opportunities to volunteer. We want to swell the ranks of docents so that we can have all three exhibit areas open simultaneously. That would require at least three docents per shift. And when we have enough docents, we will schedule longer hours because we know that our hours are not adequate for all of the public. We are working on increasing our tours. You know, that a tour can be scheduled at times other than when we are open if done in advance. We are also looking for volunteers to work in the gift shop. We will be getting national exposure in the near future. The National Trust for Historic Preservation is launching The Heritage Travel web site. We were invited to become charter members of the site. After doing due diligence as to the advantages of being featured nationally, we decided that it would be a good move. They are anticipating that the site will experience three million hits in the first year. Launching date will be April 2, 2009. They have been researching and planning for two years in preparation of the site going on line. The Trust works with members who are listed as national historic sites. We are delving into what fuller participation can mean for us. We have been members but have not been active.

Without his perseverance we would not be able to present the community with the displays and programs that we can today. 
Pay close attention to coming events, our concerts are very promising. Also, register for the Winter Quarters of the National Civil War Association at the end of February.




Tables were laden with food in the beautifully decorated Stone

Where are the Bricks?

When they are finished, all 138 of them will be set in concrete around the fountain. We expect that the process will be finished by the end of February if not sooner. Benicia and the Civil War





It was astonishing to me when I overheard a professional business person expressing disbelief that Benicia had any involvement in the Civil War. It was, after all, a war between the North and the South on the other side of the country. There was no reason for Benicia or, for that matter, Califor-

nia to be involved. Surprise! Surprise! Benicia played a very important role in the war. This fact is precisely why it is fitting that the National Civil War Association (NCWA) chooses to hold its Winter Quarters Conference here at the Benicia Historical Museum. Benicia played an extremely important role in the furnishing of arms and other supplies to the Northern army. California gold was essential to the financing of the war. Army personnel spent time in the arsenal and volunteers were recruited and fought with the New York regiment.

Benicia residents have a great opportunity to delve into the experiences of the Civil War era through the NCWA's Winter Quarters conference on February 27-March 1, 2009. This is the fourth year that the Museum is partnering with the NCWA in its Winter Quarters. Planning for this year began immediately after last year's event. The Association works diligently to engage authorities on all aspects of life during the Civil War period. Seminar periods on various subjects are from one to two hours. The seminars are led by prominent Civil War researchers and scholars as well as less known credible authorities. This year Museum board members, Dr. James Lessenger and Dan Dempsey, will be presenters of history of the arsenal and the museum buildings. Dr. Lessenger is currently researching arsenal history in preparation for publication of a book on the subject. He has an impressive PowerPoint presentation that he will share with the group. Dr Lessenger will lead a tour of the Benicia Arsenal.

While there is a great deal about the military aspects of the war, there is also emphasis on the life of the times. Subjects such as clothing, manners, photography, sewing, health and hygiene, cooking, scandals and Benicia's architecture are treated in the seminars. There is even treatment of the career of Charles P. Stone (Stone Hall is named for him) and William T. Sherman. There is something for everyone in these seminars.

You can pre-register by printing out the registration form and mailing it in. Onsite registration will be in Stone Hall February 27th from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m... Pre-registered attendees and dignitaries will be invited to dinner and a presentation by the key note speaker on Friday evening. Classes will be held in Stone Hall and Benicia High School classrooms. Saturday morning registration will be in Stone Hall.


VOLUNTEERS NEEDED
